Growing up in Colorado, Gavin loved sports, including soccer. He enlisted in the U.S. Army, attained the rank of staff sergeant and deployed to Iraq. During a one-month period, his convoy was hit by explosive devices on three separate occasions. He is the recipient of two Purple Hearts. Later returning home, he suffered two strokes and lost feeling on his right side. But he said "I couldn't let anything hold me back."

He started competing with our Paralympic Soccer Team. He represented the United States at two Paralympics and here at the Federation Gavin serves on the Athletes' Council. Gavin has worn the uniform and fought for our nation. He has worn the crest and played for our nation and we're deeply honored this morning that Gavin is with us today. I'm going to ask you to please join me in welcoming and thanking Gavin and stand as he leads us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

For a number of years, we've had a special way of balancing the votes. Carlos emphasized that we're a family and that's the essential element of our system for voting. We want every member of the United States Soccer Federation family to be a legitimate whole part of that family and that's the basis for the voting system that we have.

So we'll go ahead and explain it and I'll start out with a statement that we know we have four different councils; the Youth, the Adult, the Pro and the Athletes. The three first ones; the Youth, the Adult and the Pro, they are equally weighted. This is not new information to you, but I always do remember that sometimes we have some brand new people to our gathering here. So I'd like to explain the little details of how we do it.

We go on the basis of using the largest of those three groups and that's the Youth. In this case, you'll find out that there are 301 votes. That's not necessarily the number of people, but 301 votes, and then using magical mathematics we equate the Adult Council vote to equal that and the Pro Council vote to equal that.

> So I'll give you the details. I believe you showed the first slide that that was the Youth Council already and I presume the Adult Council was shown. Let me just run through the numbers. Looking out with the lights it's a little difficult. Okay. The Youth Council you can see 301 votes. We've listed all of the state associations, affiliate organizations and the commissioners total of 301. So mathematically the three councils; Youth, Adult and Pro must equal that. So we'll move onto the Adult.

> Same effective system here and we take 193 and we're going to have to use some magical mathematics to make 193 equal to 301 and we'll do that in a moment. So we'll move onto the Pro's. And I want to say that I'm very pleased with the attendance of the Pro's this time. This is the largest number of delegates that we've ever had and so I want to applaud them personally.

We'll move on to the others, the next slide, and you see that we have the Athletes' Council, 11 here. And that's close to the number that we had last year. That was the record that we had. That's very important. We'll move on to

And the other affiliates and you see national associations and such, other members total 14. Well represented. We'll move on. And then we have the Life Members, a critical part of our -- our membership. These are folks who have done all of the things through the years to keep us -- get us started and keep us going. So we appreciate their continuing to attend.

Next slide, the Board of
Directors and the past Presidents. This, of
course, is the first time we've had three persons
listed in that past presidents category. So Bob
Contiguglia, Dr. Bob; Alan and Sunil now is the
newest person. Sunil also does sit on the Board
of Directors, but, you see, each person can only
have one -- vote for one entity and so Sunil,

You have to have voted already. So you can see it's -- it's a very important thing.

although sitting on the Board of Directors, also -- only votes as a past president.

Okay. Next slide. And then I talked about the fact that we have a multiplier situation. So you can see on the far left all of those numbers added up. Those added up to 558 and then we have to equate the Adult Council and the Pro Council to equal the Youth Council and then the Athletes' Council. We add the 301 times 3 is 903, plus 36 is 939 and then 20 percent of the total mathematically of the 1,181 is 242. So this is our system, the multipliers, and these are already in your individual keypads and we spent time last night putting them out there on the tables at your spots.

So the Youth Council obviously one, Adult Council you can see -- I won't go through them individually, but each time we vote this is the way it works. So thank you for that.

I do want to say a couple of things here. Practice is very important in life. We do that in soccer all the time. I know. And you have keypads in front of you that look very complicated. If I can borrow yours, yes, it's a horribly complicated item, but it has power. So

let me tell you a story. Last night -- you know,
the Credentials Committee spends hours getting
ready for these events and practically spend the
whole night and I was out in the desert last night
after we finished up in here and low and behold
unbelievably two animals walked up to me.
I said "What are you doing?"

Look, we still have a lot more to do, but the past 12 months, I believe, has been a year of progress and change in these four areas. First, we had to win our bid to co-host the Men's World Cup in 2026. Our joint bid with Canada and Mexico was the first ever three country bid. So we came together and worked together as equal partners in friendship and in mutual respect. It was also the first time that all member

associations of FIFA had a vote in that decision. The question of who would host in '26 often, often became mixed with global politics. There were moments when some thought we might not win. So we put together a plan that highlighted not only our world class stadiums and cities, but also our values, our diversity and how our countries welcome people from all over the world. We waged a global campaign, we worked hard for every vote and it paid off. We won by an

our Women's National Team.

We formulized and expanded our membership department so that we're listening to and serving all of our members better. All 12 standing committees, task forces and panels have more new members than ever before, new voices and new perspectives from across the Federation. We've strengthened our commitment to diversity, equality and inclusion, including appointing our first ever Chief Talent and Inclusion Officer Tonya Wallach. And, today, we'll elect a new Independent Director and a new Vice President to help us sustain and build on these reforms.

So as we move forward, I hope we can also deal honestly with an issue that has come up over the years time after time again, the fees. The fees that you the members, including youth and adults, pay to the Federation. When you raise these concerns, we take them seriously. So we opened the books, we dug into the numbers because it's important that we all know and have the facts. And what we found is that over the years the Federation consistently gives back to our collective membership more than what it pays us in fees.

overwhelming margin and for the first time ever -sorry -- for the first time in more than 30 years the Men's World Cup will come back to America. As I've said before, and I'll say it again, this will be an extraordinary opportunity to energize soccer

in America and not just in '26, but in the years

leading up to it.

Second priority, we agreed last year that our governance had to be more open, more accountable, more inclusive with more oversight and so it's been a year of reform. I made a point to communicate with all of you regularly so that you know what's happening at the Federation and why. We created two new committees, a Technical Development Committee and a Commercial Committee so that the board now plays a greater role in all Federation activities.

All six of our board committees are now under new leadership. Meanwhile, at Soccer House, we restructured our senior management to align with the board and improve that accountability. In fact, I'm pleased that we've now named nine of our ten senior managers who report to the CEO and we're moving ahead with

our search for the first ever general manager for

This is -- this includes, for example, grants to members from our Innovate to Grow Fund. However, this doesn't include the many noncash contributions and support that members receive from the Federation. More importantly, going forward, and that's where I hope we can focus, our overall relationship and how we work together to strengthen it and that's more important to me than who pays what to whom.

Of course, growing the game requires something else, growing our budget. And as you'll hear today, we propose to draw on our surplus so that we can increase our spending budget for this new fiscal year by 18 percent to more than \$136 million. This will be our largest increase in several years and our largest budget ever allowing us to increase our investments across the board.

With that said, to truly compete with world class programs like Germany, England, France, Spain and others in Europe which have budgets that are much, much larger than ours, we still need to do dramatically better. I'm pleased that with the new major multiyear sponsorships, we are on our way, but we have a long way to go.

To that end, we have significantly increased the diversity of our workforce through thoughtful and targeted efforts at recruiting and retaining talented women and people of color. At the same time, our National Teams are increasingly diverse reflecting the evolving demographics of our country. This is, and will continue to be, an area of opportunity for us as an organization and for our sport as a whole.

As I mentioned earlier in my remarks, we continue to see value creation at the commercial level and while that is important for many reasons, it's a critical part of our future plans. As part of the budget process, the Budget Committee asked us to provide an accelerated spending plan based on our best estimates of future revenues. So, to be clear, our deficit spending position in Fiscal '20, and over the next several years, is based on accelerating our programming to grow the game while looking to

renew our commercial agreements beyond the 2022 timeframe.

This August -- or past August -we started a budget process by reviewing the five-year framework from the Board of Directors discussing the key revenue and expense drivers in the context of the framework and then looking more closely at Fiscal Year 2020 and the drivers and opportunities that we would project. In October of last year, we had more granular discussions of the Fiscal Year 2020 drivers, opportunities and tied that into how we were going to measure efforts so we could track our progress.

With these parameters in place, the staff continued to work on creating the budget. So you have the committee and the staff working on this. This is very -- a very big process. Then in November, we had our final discussions and review of the Fiscal 2020 budget in its entirety, along with how it would fit into our five-year investment plan.

After an in-depth conversation, the Budget and Finance Committee voted unanimously to recommend approval of the budget to the Board of Directors. In December of last year, the board

And, to that end, we launched in November a strategic plan for CONCACAF. We launched a process, a process that will take 18 months, that will culminate at some point in 2020 and that process will involve all the
